My first visit to Christ in the Wilderness was in the spring of 1998. With few exceptions, I have returned every year since then. My annual stay at Christ in the Wilderness is a time to pray, reflect, renew my spirit and deepen my relationship with God. This is the place

where I find refuge, solitude, and blessed silence.

Sometimes I have come to CITW when facing a major life change. One year I arrived shortly after experiencing a tragic loss. Other times I arrive simply needing to escape the busyness of everyday life. Over the years my stays at Christ in the Wilderness have

helped me deal with change, plan for the future, and come to terms with loss. This wonderful retreat is always the haven, the refuge I need.

I have treasured the quiet, the beautiful surroundings, the presence of wildlife, the occasional glorious sunset. I have enjoyed long walks on the trails and my time alone in the chapel. I usually stay in Sabbath Place, the hermitage high in the trees on the hill to the south. I spend most of the time on the porch, either reading or journaling, or even just sitting quietly, always with one eye on the birds at the bird feeder. From the porch, I have



watched wild turkeys parade up the steps toward the hermitage, deer grazing right in front of the porch, and birds flocking to the feeder. My bird list gets longer every year!

I bring my own music (years ago, I brought tapes . . . now CD's, soon an MP3 player?) I usually bring reading material, though I have also found books I loved in

> the library at the main house. The days go so quickly I am always surprised when my stay ends. Every year I leave rested, at peace, and with a renewed sense of God's presence in my life.

I think of the time I spend at Christ in the Wilderness as a special gift I give myself. Thomas Merton wrote the following about his hermitage. He has captured the way I feel about Christ in the Wilderness.
